MESSAGE FROM FR ALBAN

Dear Parishioners,

One of the things I always dread is going for an eye test at the opticians. I always feel stupid at the point where I'm given different lenses and asked "do the letters look clearer with this one, or that one?' I simply can't decide. Yet when I receive new glasses, I am totally amazed at the difference. Suddenly I can see things that I couldn't before. Without realising it I had settled for blurry vision and poor focus. I was comfortable with the status quo. It is often the same in our lives. We allow sin and circumstances to blur our vision of the truth. We easily become complacent and accept our blurry vision as "just the way it is."

Today's Gospel story is about more than just the blindness of Bartimaeus; it's also about the blindness of the people around him who are trying to intimidate and silence him, and keep him from asking for help.

The question Jesus asked Bartimaeus is also asked of us today. "What do you want me to do for you?' What might be our response here and now? We can only hear these words though if we tune in to Jesus' words frequently. It takes time and we have to make time for it because there are many things that always try to distract us from reading the Scriptures, or praying, but this time is very well spent because to pray helps us to distinguish our needs from our wants.

Bartimaeus tells Jesus directly: 'Master, let me see again.' This is a direct, simple and humble example of prayer. And we know, when Jesus heard this simple expression of his faith, he answered that prayer.

It is significant where the healing of Bartimaeus takes place – at Jericho, which was one of the most strongly fortified cities in the land of Canaan, and yet, the Israelites conquered it and its walls came tumbling down.

There is a Jericho in each of our lives that place of fear, of dread, of challenge. But we must remember that Jericho is the place where God makes the impossible, possible. Each of us has the potential to be like Bartimaeus. Like him, are we ready to throw off all that keeps us from the Lord, to run to Him and follow Him?

Bartimaeus was the one who was blind and could only 'sit at the side of the road, but who then becomes the one who walks and follows the Lord because his eyes have been opened. In order to see with eyes of faith we don't need to go to an optician. We need to hear the voice which says to us:

"Courage, get up, the Lord is calling you." Jesus, son of David have mercy on us, and open our eyes to Your Ways. Amen.
