MESSAGE FROM FR ALBAN

Dear Parishioners,

Last weekend, our Confirmation candidates were on retreat at St. Cassian's Centre in Kintbury. Many thanks to the team at St Cassian's, as well as to Fr Gabriel who celebrated Mass for the candidates at St Cassian's and to Anne-Marie McBrien, Lucy Gallagher and Marc Servais who accompanied them. Please pray for all our *confirmandi* and their catechists as they prepare for the celebration of the sacrament in May.

In today's first reading we hear these stirring words: Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory,

Holy. Perhaps, like me you instinctively cringe whenever that word is mentioned. Monks are especially wary of that word, following what St Benedict tells us in his Rule: Do not aspire to be called holy before you really are, but first be holy that you may more truly be called so. (*Rule of St Benedict* 4:62)

Many of us perhaps associate the word 'holy' with some kind of grimness. We think "holy" people are those who look as if they have been steeped in vinegar or soaked in embalming fluid. Yet the fact remains that each one of us is called to holiness. What does that mean?

It means that each of us is invited to deepen our awareness of the presence of the Triune God within us: The Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, in the seemingly mundane reality of our everyday lives, a relationship that is both personal and communal. We are called together, as God's people. In the words of Pope Francis, "growth in holiness is a journey in a community, side by side with others."

What does Isaiah's vision mean for us, here and now? Isaiah is very specific about the timing of his vision of the thrice holy God:" "in the year that King Uzziah died." The reference to the timing anchors the vision in Isaiah's own life history. It was for him a defining moment. So often, encounters with God are interwoven with the events in our lives. Perhaps it's only with hindsight that we realise God was powerfully present to us at a particular moment – perhaps at a birth, a marriage, a death or some other significant milestone in our lives.

Some of us may have been fortunate to have had powerful experiences of God's presence – in my own life I can think of two early ones which had significant consequences for my later life. But that's another story.

Our passage from Isaiah ends with the words 'Here I am! send me!'"

"Here I am!, send me!" often is the first response of someone who senses a call from God, but once it becomes clear what God might have in store for them, "Choose somebody else" may be their response.

In a way, Isaiah's story, Isaiah's experience, happens to us all. Not necessarily in a dramatic and overwhelming way as it did for him, but usually in a quiet and ordinary way – not with a live coal wielded by a seraph, (thank goodness!) but in the ordinary experiences of life's ups and downs, frustrations and anxieties, disappointments and hassles.

'Who, me? I'm nothing special' we might respond when we are faced with a new challenge, either a promotion at work, or being asked to take on a new role or ministry within our church or local community. Yet the wonderful thing is that despite what we feel, God will provide what we need, he graciously rewards us for our years of faithful attendance at worship, for our attempts to live good Christian lives, for our acts of kindness and generosity to others. God will help us to bear fruit.

Today, may we all have the courage to make those words of Isaiah our own: 'Here I am. Send me!'
