MESSAGE FROM FR ALBAN

Dear Parishioners,

These days, many of us are very dependent on our mobile phones. We are reluctant to switch them off or put them on silent just in case we miss something. And yet, a mobile phone can ring in the most inappropriate places such as a church, a theatre or cinema. When a phone does ring at such a moment, one's instant reaction is of indignant disapproval at someone's thoughtlessness. Then, like a wave of nausea, the awful truth sweeps over us: it's actually our 'phone! This, incidentally, was my own experience some years ago in the middle of Mass in a school!

Why is it that certain messages just don't sink in? Why can't we engage with '*Please turn off your 'phone*? Because we feel intuitively, our default position, is that it's intended for other people.

So what about other messages? What about those we hear in today's Gospel, such as: *Blessed are the poor; woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation.... woe to you who laugh now.* To whom are they directed? Truthfully, most of us would assume, someone else. Most of us feel this message is not directed at me, doesn't involve me. It's easier to do that because St Matthew's version of this same sermon, the version we are more familiar with, spiritualises Jesus' warnings: *Blessed are the poor in spirit; blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness.* There is a reassuring abstractness about that; we add it to the list of spiritual aims we that we keep somewhere down at the bottom of our religious handbag. Useful to mention in confession. But not to lose sleep over.

But here, in St Luke's version of the sermon on the mount, there is no guiltabsolving abstraction. It's brutal, bodily: *Blessed are the poor. Blessed are the hungry. Woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation.* Our first thought is that Jesus is speaking these words to those on the extremes: the very rich, and the very poor. And since most of us would consider ourselves neither very rich nor very poor, but somewhere in the middle, the message cannot be intended for us. It's a sermon for others; not me.

And yet, the Gospel wasn't written for other people. It was written for us, for me. Jesus often points out that things we think are all about other people, actually involve us. He spent much of his time debunking the Pharisees - who naturally assumed any message of repentance, any call to change and renew, referred to other people: It never occurred to them to question their own religious practice or motivation.

Blessed are the poor; woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation...I don't think our Lord is necessarily criticising our bulging wallets and stupendous bank balances – most of us don't have those things – as much as our supposition that we have done all that needs to be done, that our way of life is not lived at the expense of anyone else, that we are self-contained.

It's not good enough to be content. Jesus makes us uncomfortable about the way our faith impacts our lives. He turns usual standards upon their head; God has more compassion for those who are sleeping on the streets than those who are in church this morning. God gives more blessings to those who are struggling with benefit claims than to those who put food on the family table. God dislikes your partying when it means you have no thought for the misery of those around you.

Anyone who thought that Jesus was simply meek and mild is in for a shock. Anyone who thinks that faith in Him is simply about saying prayers and going to Mass is not heeding the warnings. Faith, especially Catholic faith, has to get involved, make a difference be political, it has to intervene in public life, it has to intervene in my life. Redemption does not just spread like 'flu, you sort of catch it, by osmosis. It has to be made real, and that can only happen if *we* make it real, by recognising the gospel message challenging us, changing us. Wake up, break into your usual pattern of behaviour - it's your 'phone that is ringing.
